October 1, 2016

Wellington Garden Club began August 1, 2016 with a checking account balance of \$26,662.08.

Income since then totaled \$1,341.00 primarily from the floral design and garden art.

Expenses since August 1^{st} were \$1,955.92 and adjustments of \$598.92 primarily for management expense to include yearbook and insurance and program services to include environmental education and hospitality.

NEWS OF OUR JUNIOR AND YOUTH GARDENS

Our junior and youth gardeners are planning their activities for the coming school year and it looks as if they have some exciting projects ahead of them. Here is a quick overview of what's in the works at the various schools in our area.

- **Binks Forest Elementary** Starla Davis, Leader Recently I had the pleasure of assisting Starla Davis, the fifth grade teacher who leads this enthusiastic group of twenty-five 3rd, 4th and 5th graders called the **Green Squad.** We worked to clean up the butterfly garden installed last school year in the courtyard facing their classrooms. Plans for this year include adding pavers for pathways in the garden, refreshing the planting beds and mulched areas, planting more butterfly-attracting plants and refurbishing some large planters in front of the school. They meet every other Tuesday from 2:00-3:00 p.m. and would welcome help from WGC members to assist them with sprucing up the butterfly garden in the courtyard outside their classrooms. - **Pine Jog Elementary** Lori Vanis, leader This school has a hydroponic garden along with two sets of raised-bed gardens. I will be meeting soon with Lori to determine how WGC can assist with their garden projects and the days and times help is needed from our members.
- Wynnebrook Elementary Janet Stein & Tim Hadsell, Co-leaders held a "wake-up" the gardens day in the Wynnebrook Elementary courtyard on Thursday, October 20 that involved uncovering the beds, adding soil, mixing the new soil in with current soil, etc. Additionally, WGC members helped the students install plants in the square foot gardens as well as other gardening tasks needed in the school's courtyard. On Wednesday October 26, WGC volunteers worked again with Wynnebrook students at the Elks garden and in the kitchen. - Girl Scout Troop 22222 Allison Zimmerman, leader The Scouts have done a cleanup of
 the native plant garden they installed near the Wellington dog park. They also were out in full
 force to participate in the planting at the Wellington Environmental Preserve for National
 Public Lands Day. More details on the Scout troops activities will be shared with you as soon
 as they are available.
- Palm Beach Central High School Lisa Ferrano, leader This high school club under the guidance of science teacher Toni Riebe and WGC member Lisa Ferrano hopes to plant a vegetable garden at the school this year. The club also will refurbish a wildflower garden on campus and has a tentative plan to work with the Million Orchid Project at Pine Jog Environmental Center to install orchids in the oaks trees in the butterfly garden at the Wellington Preserve on Flying Cow Road in Wellington.

RECAP OF AROUND AND ABOUT TRIP - Tuesday, October 18, 2016



On Tuesday, October 18th, Kevin Easton, president of the Palm Beach County Beekeepers, let us observe bees in their natural environment. He told us what they were doing, who was doing it, and why. Did you know that only female bees sting? Did you know that all the male bee does is look for a queen to impregnate? Did you know that male bees' eyes are three to four times larger than females?

It can be difficult to make sense of what is going on inside a beehive...they look so disorganized. But not so, their activity is quite simple. There are 3 main types of bee in the hive. At the top of the line is the Queen and identified by her abdomen, which is much larger than any other bee. She is supported by thousands of female workers ("worker bee") and, in the summer, hundreds of male drones whose function is to mate with the queen. Drones do not work and are evicted by the workers and die in early autumn.



The queen is central to the survival of every colony by laying eggs, and during April and May, she lays day and night (2,000

eggs a day) and more than her own body weight. She mates only once but holds sufficient sperm from the male drones to lay eggs for 3-5 years. Actually, the only work the male drone does is to fly around outside the hive waiting to mate with the queen. Then they die off. In a healthy hive, this routine fluctuates with the seasons and goes on for years. An aging queen may leave the hive with up to 60 percent of the workers and fly off to start a new hive leaving a daughter queen to inherit the original hive. If she is ailing and no longer producing, the colony may sting her to death.



In order for Kevin to show us the various hives, it was necessary for him to smoke out the bee hives which caused them to fly out while he picked up the various hives to show us how they work. Amazingly, he handled all these hives with no coveralls or facial protection, and we were able to get very close to take pictures of the bees at work. He showed us that young workers stay in the hive focusing on domestic tasks for the first few weeks after birth. They may attend the queen, clean the hive and remove debris, dust and pollen. Once the wax glands are functioning, the workers can build honeycombs and use wax to cap cells holding pupae. They store food by packing empty

cells with pollen for later use and fan evaporation to preserve honey in cells. Older workers go out and gather nectar, water and pollen for the hive. The workers act as guards and when sensing danger, they produce an alarm pheromone to warn the hive of your presence.

The culmination of our tour was in his kitchen where he gave us samples of the various natural honey to taste and to purchase. The honey was delicious! He also showed us how he removes the honey from the comb once it is ready to market and bottle. We were all in agreement that this tour was extremely interesting and gave us a tremendous understanding of beekeeping. Lunch followed for nine of us at a lovely Thai restaurant close by. Thank you to our new Around and About Chair, Kimberly Helms, for organizing this educational and fun event to learn about protecting our pollinators.

"Raisin' Cane" – U. S. Sugar Headquarters, Clewiston

We will be taking a bus trip to Clewiston for a tour "Raisin' Cane" which includes lunch at no cost to the members and guests attending this outing. You are welcome to invite friends and family to join us. The bus seats 50 people so let's fill it up.

Get a close-up look at how sugar is made, from field to pantry, during our Raisin' Cane Tours. Held Monday thru Friday, the public tours provide a behind-the-scenes view of how sugar and oranges

are grown, harvested, processed and sent to your local grocery store. Participants learn about the history and development of the area and U.S. Sugar, tour U.S. Sugar's facilities, and get a sample of our sweetest crop.

"The Raisin' Cane Tours are a great opportunity to learn about our region and who we are and what we do," said Jennifer Black, U.S. Sugar's community relations manager. "We hope tour guests leave with a better understanding and sweet appreciation of the hard work that goes into making the sugar found in many of our favorite foods."

During the tours, participants also visit Southern Gardens Citrus, a subsidiary of U.S. Sugar, and sample its 100 percent, pure Florida orange juice. They learn about other crops grown on the farms, such as corn, green beans and other vegetables, and see Lake Okeechobee, which is world famous for its bass fishing. The day culminates with a free, home-cooked, southern-style lunch at a local restaurant.

We urge you to attend this very special dedication, which is being chaired by WGC member and former National Garden Clubs President Barbara May. Funding for the marker was provided by a grant from the Florida State Elks Association.

Some of you may wonder "What is a Blue Star Marker?" The Blue Star Memorial Program, which began in 1944, honors all men and women who serve or have served in the United States Armed Services. About a year after the program began, it was adopted as National Garden Clubs' first nationwide project. Over 3,000 markers have been placed all across the country to date and the program remains one of the most prominent activities of NGC. Today, the program includes Highway Markers, Memorial Markers and By-Way Markers to be used at locations such as National cemeteries, parks, veteran's facilities and gardens. We are truly fortunate to have this marker installed at the South Florida National Cemetery where over 17,000 veterans and their spouses are buried.

Wellington Garden Club Welcomes Youth in 2016 International Coastal Cleanup

Thank you to all the young and young in spirit who participated in the 2016 International Coastal



Cleanup at Ocean Ridge Inlet Park and Beach on Saturday, Sept. 17th. We had 40 participants from Spanish River High School in Boca Raton, 12 from the EYC youth group of St. David's inthe-Pines Episcopal Church in Wellington along with about 20 Wellington Garden Club (WGC) members and their families and friends. One lady came back with a folding chair and then went back to the beach to collect two more 5 gallon bucket full of garbage as she explained that this beach is so special you just can't help but go back to pick up more garbage.

This year the students quickly caught on to downloading the App, "Clean Swell" on their smart phones and recorded the garbage data on real time as it was being collected. This gave the Ocean Conservancy even better data as they were able to track where the trash was being collected. And our two WGC members John Siena and Jim Thompson weighed all the garbage collected with a portable weight scale to get the final weight of 132.3 lbs. WOW....that is more than what some people weigh!!!

And then there were those special moments when grandparents and grandchildren walked together to clean the beach and inlet park. WGC member Jim Thompson had brought his granddaughter Lynne Gunnels and WGC member Kathy Schneider had brought her granddaughter Jordan Neltner. Ten members of Wellington Garden Club travelled to Boca Raton a few weeks ago to represent our club at the 2016

District X Fall Meeting. Two members, Caren Griffin and Bobbi Ziegler, were first-time District meeting attendees. We were joined by over 130 District X members representing all of the 16 clubs throughout our District. Early in the meeting there was a touching memorial to



deceased members of District X clubs. President Kathy Siena (shown at right) represented WGC and placed a rose in memory of WGC member Bonnie Wenham who died earlier this year.
