# Pratt & Whitney Awards \$10,000 Green Power Grant By Deanna Usiadek, Manager, Communications Pratt & Whitney

Wellington Garden Club and West Palm Beach Elks Lodge #1352 dig in to help Wynnebrook Elementary make the grade in going green

**JUPITER, Florida, Oct. 12, 2015** – Wynnebrook Elementary School in West Palm Beach is going green with the help of a \$10,000 Green Power Grant from Pratt & Whitney. Pratt & Whitney, a division of United Technologies Corp. (NYSE: UTX), is a world leader in the design, manufacture and service of aircraft engines and auxiliary power units.

To kick off its yearlong commitment to go green, the school recently joined thousands of other schools across the globe in hosting a Green Apple Day of Service event. Close to 100 community volunteers grabbed their favorite gardening tools and gloves and spent a Saturday morning transforming Wynnebrook's courtyard into a first-class sustainable learning environment for students.

"Our goal is to make being green a way of life for everyone at our school," said Jeff Pegg, Wynnebrook's principal for more than 16 years.

Volunteers at the school's Green Apple Day of Service event included Wynnebrook administrators, faculty, staff, students and parents; employees from Pratt & Whitney; and representatives from the Wellington Garden Club, West Palm Beach Elks Lodge #1352 and Florida Atlantic University Pine Jog Environmental Educational Center.

Also volunteering was County Commissioner Paulette Burdick. "It is heartwarming to see businesses and organizations in our community coming together to enhance the learning environment at Wynnebrook and engaging students in the process," Burdick said. "Teaching students how to care for our planet is one of the most important investments we can make in our future."

The volunteers laid down more than 80 bags of eco-mulch, and planted 250 pollinator-friendly plants, 50 wild native flowers and three butterfly-friendly vines. They also prepared three raised beds for vegetables and herbs with six yards of organic veggie mix soil.

Partnering with Pratt & Whitney to make Wynnebrook's Green Apple Day of service a success were the Wellington Garden Club, West Palm Beach Elks Lodge #1352, Indian Trails Native Nursery, Whole Foods Market, Sam's Club and Target.

Barbara Hadsell, a member of the Wellington Garden Club and key organizer of the Wynnebrook Green Apple Day of Service, said getting students outside and excited about nature at an early age has many benefits. "Gardening is a great way for students to experience the satisfaction that comes from caring for something over time," she added. "It helps build their self-esteem and teaches them caring about our natural resources is an everyday activity that takes commitment."

"It is a responsibility and privilege to give back to the communities in which our employees live and work," said Mike O'Neill, manager of Systems Engineering Validation at Pratt & Whitney. "I am proud to work for a company that is an internationally recognized leader in green technologies and environmental sustainability, and is engaged in helping schools everywhere become green."

United Technologies Corp. is a founding sponsor of the U.S. Green Building Council's Center for Green Schools, which created the Green Apple Day of Service in 2012. The Center is making sure every student has the opportunity to attend a green school within this generation. From kindergarten to college and beyond, the Center works directly with staff, teachers, faculty, students, administrators, elected officials and communities to drive the transformation of all schools into sustainable places to live, learn, work and play.

"I am grateful to all those who helped us take our first big step toward making Wynnebrook Elementary a high-performance green school as well as a high-performance academic school," Pegg said. "As a community, we sent a powerful message to our students that we care about them and their learning environment," Pegg said. I am especially thankful to Pratt & Whitney for the Green Power Grant, which made our Green Apple Day of Service possible and will fund numerous green classroom and schoolyard activities throughout the year."




Join us for a fun filled craft class where we will re purpose old wine bottles and plain glass flower containers and turn them in to decorative art for

#### **HORTICULTURE**

## WHAT KIND OF BULB PLANTS CAN I GROW IN SOUTH FLORIDA?

Although I miss my Tulips and Daffodils, I have come to love other plants grown from bulbs that thrive here in our climate. The holidays are a popular time to gift Amaryllis bulbs. They thrive in full sun 6-8 hours and like it dry. Plant these bulbs with the neck of the bulb at or slightly above ground level. Once you have leaves, fertilize monthly with a 10-10-10. They usually bloom in April and May and you should leave all the foliage on the plant after blooming. Just cut the flower stalk down 3-5 inches above the bulb.

Another beauty is the Eucharis Lily shown at right, originating in Columbia. This lily thrives in warm temperatures and partial shade and is known for its brilliant white blooms that are also fragrant. It has beautiful shiny dark green foliage that is also very attractive. Large mature clumps can flower at different times of the year but mostly in the spring. Keep the soil moist allowing the surface to dry between waterings.



Canna Lily are bold tropical looking plants that bloom in summer and are very cold hardy to zone 7b! Their bulbs are called Rhizomes that spread underground. Plant them at a distance because the leaves tend to get chewed, but you want to enjoy the visual impact of the flowers from a distance toward the back of the planting bed.



Blood Lily is one of my favorites here. These beauties need rich well-drained soil, so make sure to add some compost or manure to the soil. They thrive in partial shade or bright sunlight. Keep soil consistently moist but never soggy. Reduce water and allow the foliage to die down in late summer when the plant goes dormant and withhold watering until spring. Use a light application of a well balanced fertilizer. Early fall is a good time to divide your bulbs and share them with a Garden Club friend!

## **GROWING PAPERWHITES IN FLORIDA**

Here's a bulb that is a delightful gift for the holidays – Paperwhites. They will bloom indoors in the fall and winter without any soil. You just nestle the ends of the bulbs into a container filled with an inch or so of gravel or glass beads, and add water up to the bottoms of the bulbs. Then place them in a sunny spot. The indoor light and warm temperature will induce the flowers to grow so tall they will pull over the container. To prevent such a disaster, once the bulbs start to show green shoots about one to two inches tall, replace the original water in the pot with a mixture of I part gin or vodka to 7 parts of water. This results in paperwhites that are one-third shorter but three times happier!

## NATIONAL GARDEN CLUBS GARDENING STUDY SCHOOL November 17-18 in Miramar

Do you know what Gardening Study School is all about? The curriculum is divided into a series of four individual courses consisting of 10 hours of instruction each, and is open to any Garden Club member. District XII will be offering Course I in November and Course II April 12 & 13, 2016. Course III and IV will take place in November of 2016 and March/April of 2017. The courses, which may be taken in any order, are structured to stimulate interest and impart knowledge for growing plants to the peak of perfection.

Course content is presented in lecture format by horticultural professionals. Topics include the study of basic botany for gardeners, soils, houseplants, and propagation. Also covered are such topics as how new plants are developed and evaluated, factors that influence plant growth, container gardening, pruning techniques, growing outdoor flowers and vegetables, specialized styles of gardening, growing plants indoors and/or under lights, and growing trees and shrubs.

Students are encouraged to take the optional exam offered the afternoon of the second day in order to become a NGC accredited Gardening Consultant. The registration fee for Course I, (which includes lunch both days), is \$65; Exam fee is \$8. Registration deadline is Nov. 6. Special group rate for a double room at the Wingate Hotel in Miramar is \$89 per night plus tax. Breakfast is included.

Lauderdale Flyway Cities Coalition is a coalition of over 60 groups, cities, and agencies in Broward County that care about protecting and increasing habitat for resident and migratory wildlife.
