### TREASURERS REPORT September 2017 *Silvia Evans, Treasurer*

Wellington Garden Club began September 1, 2017 with a checking account balance of \$16,616.90

Income, since then, totaled \$ 1206.52 primarily from donations, including \$1,000 towards hospitality from a private donor, \$100 in plant raffle earnings and \$56.52 for Hurricane victims, as well as a few garden art registration fees.

Expenses since September 1<sup>st</sup> were \$2006.27 primarily for the accounting fees (annual accountant's review of the WGC financial records), printing, community gardens, and speaker expenses. In addition, there was a \$1200 Habitat for Humanity /FAU/Pine Jog donation.

Additionally, for more detailed information the WGC profit & loss versus annual budget report will be e-mailed.

Current balance as of September 30, 2017 in the Wellington Garden Club checking account is 15,781.15

**Ikebana, The Art of Japanese Flower Arrangement**



Kathy Jones is the Co-President of the Ikenobo Ikebana Society of South Florida. She will be demonstrating the fascinating art of Japanese Flower Arrangement.

In 1988, Kathy was sponsored by the Florida Cultural Education Department to participate in a year-long study program under Atsuko Lefcourte from Kyoto, Japan, who was assigned to create and develop Ikebana chapters in the Greater New York area before moving to Florida. Kathy has served as an officer of the Ikebana South Florida Chapter since 1990 and has hosted the Headmaster from Japan. In 2008, she attended an intensive week-long study tour in Kyoto, Japan and has since organized and participated in several chapter symposiums.



Kathy has achieved Special Teacher Membership status, conducted workshops, programs and demonstrations for sister chapters, Ikebana International, International Orchid Show, garden clubs and other organizations. She currently teaches classes at the Morikami Museum in Delray Beach and Temple Emanu-El of Palm Beach.

## AROUND & ABOUT – Thursday, October 19, 2017 Recap of Million Orchid Project at Pine Jog Environmental Center

Braving torrential downpours, fifteen WGC members journeyed to Pine Jog Environmental Center to learn about the Million Orchid Project and how microscopic native orchid seeds are grown in the lab. After the seeds are collected in the wild, they are planted in sterile, sealed containers like the one shown below in a growing medium that



simulates the wild fungus nutrients the orchids need to flourish. In about 18 months, the tiny orchids are ready to be transplanted into the wild where their growth will be tracked for the next five years. The ultimate goal of the Million Orchid project is that native orchids will

once again be found in great abundance in the hardwood trees of south Florida, as they were prior to the 20<sup>th</sup> century. For more photos see: [www.wellingtongardenclub.org](http://www.wellingtongardenclub.org)

Camp Wekiva is AMAZING!!!! I have been a volunteer at Camp Wekiva twice in the past 3 years and have thoroughly enjoyed the experience. In 2015, I raised my hand to do a short stint during Critter Camp and spent 3 days/2 nights, helping with 6-7 year olds. That was my grandson's first time there, as well. What fun!

This past summer, I spent a whole week during Boys' Week and had an amazing time with 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> grade boys. They are still really sweet at that

age. I shared a cabin with 3 gals from the Homosassa Garden Club, who were all pals. These gals were terrific, and I now have 3 new friends! (We have communicated several times since being cabin-mates.) It had been many years since I had slept in a cabin in the woods, but knowing the cabins were air conditioned for adult volunteers made it much more appealing. Every morning there is a ceremony to raise the flag and each evening, the flag is retired, all by formal Color Guard ceremony performed by rotating groups of youngsters. Many campers attend for several years and have such great experiences that they wind up being Counselors. The counselors are terrific!

National Public Lands Day (NPLD) Saturday, September 30, 2017

Wellington Garden Club volunteers Kathy Siena and Lisa Ferrano organized and planned the 4<sup>th</sup> annual tree planting community event which took place last Saturday, September 30, 2017 on National Public Lands Day (NPLD). More than 65 volunteers from Wellington Garden Club, local packs from Cub Scouts, and Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts Troops, Palm Beach Central High School and Wellington High School planted 750 native Florida Slash Pine seedlings and about 100 native Cardinal shrubs in the Wellington Environmental Preserve on Flying Cow Road. Village of Wellington Councilwoman, Tanya Siskind, joined in on the volunteer efforts as well. Village of Wellington Landscape/Forestry Operations Supervisor, Brian Hopper, and his staff gave tremendous support by preparing the seedlings that were planted and pre-drilling holes where the seedlings were placed. The thunderstorms held off for the morning, and there was plenty of sunshine and cold water to go around as the volunteers moved along the pathway and through the grounds planting the trees.

Thank you to all the volunteers who came out to help on this important nationally-recognized day when the Village of Wellington community volunteers helped our environment by being earth stewards on that special day. We look forward to planning another big day at the Preserve on Saturday, September 22, 2018 on NPLD day.

## **WGC MEMBERS SUPPORT NATURAL DISASTER RELIEF**

In response to Deep South Region Director Ann McCormick's request, members in September gave a free will offering of \$57 toward restoring gardens in the Houston area that were devastated by Hurricane Harvey. Also, after Hurricane Irma's damage to our state, members responded at the October meeting with donations totaling \$133 for the Deep South Natural Disaster Irma Relief fund. Note that on NGC's Facebook page, garden club members across the nation are being asked to give as much as possible to Penny Pines for reforestation efforts for California. In addition, our Coral Reef Foundation is also in need of funds to help restore damaged reefs along Florida's coastline.

Closer to home, ten of our WGC Master Gardeners have formed a committee to assist in the restoration and possible expansion of Gene Joyner's "Incredible Acres Botanic Gardens" where extensive damage occurred from a twister spawned by Hurricane Irma. We're delighted to report that a grant for \$4,000 has been received from the NGC Natural Disaster Fund to purchase replacement palms and tropical rare fruit trees. In the near future, we plan to ask local WGC-sponsored Jr. Garden Clubs and Scout troops to participate in several plantings culminating with a dedication on January 20, 2018, Florida Arbor Day. Committee members are: Doreen Baxter, Linda DeSanti, Mary Drexler, Larry Grosser, Barbara Hadsell, Ann Hlasnicek, Sandy Sklar, Danese Sloan-Kendall, Barbara Zenker and Bobbi Ziegler. All of our Master Gardeners were educated by Gene with a tour of his botanic gardens.

The Tradition of our Annual International Coastal Beach Cleanup Continues .... in Spite of Hurricane Irma in 2017



What do you do when you are scheduled for a beach cleanup with no ice or water because of Hurricane Irma? You just postpone it for a couple of weeks like October 7th and be ever so grateful you still have your house intact. Even though we had less than last year's attendance and collection, we still had our Barbeque and lots of fun. Our total number of volunteers were 21, and we collected 43 pounds of trash.

Here we are, trying to engage as many young people as we can by inviting St. David's Church from Wellington and other families only to realize that we adults have left our young people with issues like sea level rising right at their footsteps as shown a few hours later. This water from the inlet side has gone over the sea wall and into our picnic area. It occurs at high tide and serves as a reminder of the effects of global warming. Our hope now is for the next generation to somehow fix this problem, and it all starts by beach cleanups and awareness.






