



Wellington Garden Club Helps in the Decision to Maintain Green Space at Wellington Mall

In the middle of Covid pandemic, when WGC in person meetings were shut down, development builder Brefrank Inc. was on the Village of Wellington March 23, 2021 Tuesday night agenda to ask that the 1997 conservation easement be erased from the existing map in order that he may proceed to develop 17.62 acres of what was deemed "conservation for perpetuity". More than any other group in attendance was the Wellington Garden Club to offer their environmental support. Some picket on Forest Hill Blvd before the meeting while others gave their three minute speeches on why keeping the green at the Wellington Green is so important. No one though could argue that Drew Martin - Conservation Chairman of the Loxahatchee chapter of the Sierra Club, Board Member of Friends of Florida and was recognized by the Wellington Garden Club as an FFGC (Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc.) Earth Steward - was the most influential speaker as he repeatedly said that Brefrank Inc. agreed to using this map with conservation

easements in 1997 when the company built the Wellington Green Mall and there was no reason to change the map now. Eventually, there was a motion and a second to vote on whether to keep the original map and the vote 3-2 in favor of the environmentalists won the day - something that rarely happens. Vice Mayor John T. McGovern, Michael Drahos and Tanya Siskind were the three that voted in favor of keeping the original map with the conservation easements while Mayor Anne Gerwig and Michael J. Napoleone were the two that voted against it.

Mind you it is the greenery in Wellington that soothes the soul. The 17.62 acres includes the vast amount of trees you see on the south side of Forest Hill Blvd between Stribling and Starbucks while going to SR 7 and it would only have taken one council person to have flipped the results.

Election matters. Your vote matters. And let us not forget that on this evening Wellington Garden Club mattered too.






Butterfly babies on my patio —Nancy Cinieri

Every time she visits, she wants to go out to the patio and water all of my (she calls me GiGi) plants. I have opportunities to teach her about taking care of plants, trees and gardens. I guess it is never too soon to start teaching our children about caring for our gardens.

A Whole New Garden, Oh My!

My backyard garden in Wellington developed slowly over 21 years and was a real learning experience, sometimes successful and sometimes not. All in all, it gave me great joy and many hours of pleasure, not to mention back breaking work! I now find myself with a new challenge—a brand new space and basically a blank palette, albeit much smaller. The builder installed the usual low-maintenance plants and a few trees on the property. And so it begins.

Where to start? Which plants to choose? Is there a theme?

In my last garden, it just evolved. I would see a new plant, buy it and find an empty spot in the yard. That can happen in a larger space, but not so much here.

My focus was the back yard since enjoying the water/patio view is a definite priority. A crepe myrtle and gumbo limbo are the anchor trees for my two new planting beds, placed at the outer corners of the yard to enhance, not block the main view.



I used spray paint to outline a modified triangular area at the back corners. The unwanted grass was sprayed with a non-selective herbicide (Roundup). A week later the dead sod was removed.



I wanted color, plants that wouldn't grow too tall and some that would attract butterflies. The new children would be in full sun all day so that needed to be factored in as well. Lower plants in the front, taller ones in the back. That was the basic plan. Off to the nursery I went.

I chose some mammy croton as foundational plants in the back, blue salvia, red pentas, blue daze,



lantana, crossandra, milkweed, and white sweet alyssum for the front border. After taking into consideration their growth habits (width and height), I placed them accordingly and began to plant. I made both beds symmetrical. The soil was pretty decent so I did not feel the need to amend, but I did broadcast a granular, slow-release type fertilizer over the entire bed after planting. Then mulched to finish it off.

Lastly, I thoroughly watered all my new babies and hoped for the best. They would be irrigated by the HOA controlled watering system,

but for the first two weeks I hand-watered them each morning with my hose. Morning watering is best to keep plants hydrated through the heat of the day. Watering at night promotes fungus.

It's been four months since installation and everything is doing well. We are in winter so growth has been at a minimum and the color is muted. But come April, the gardens will be flourishing, bursting with color, butterflies and bees. I did bring some plants from my former property and plan to add them to other garden spaces, but that will happen slowly. The old gray mare, she ain't what she used to be!




