# A Brief History of the Annual Tree Plantings

Wellington Garden Club held its first tree planting in 2013, when club member, Lisa Ferrano, investigated the possibility of planting and growing more trees in our Village. She worked with a former public works department supervisor to organize planting more trees in the Wellington Environmental Preserve and invited some high school students, members of the Garden Club and town officials to join in.

Club member and chairperson, Kathy Siena helped Lisa manage the tree plantings, making them a larger community-wide event, and helping to educate everyone involved in the importance of planting trees to beautify the Village of Wellington.

Kathy and Lisa planned the tree plantings to coincide with National Public Lands Day (NPLD) which is usually held on the fourth Saturday of September.

All the tree plantings have been held at the Wellington Environmental Preserve, except for the one in 2018, which was held at Peaceful Waters Sanctuary.

With the help of Village Landscape Superintendent, Will Gurney, Native Florida Slash Pine (Pinus elliotti "Densa") seedlings are ordered and grown from native plant nurseries and planted in pre-dug holes by the volunteers. Over the years we have also planted firebush (Hamelia patens), Simpson's red stopper (Eugenia confuse), elderberry (Myrsine gerianensis) and native cardinal shrubs (Lobelia cardinalis). Here's how we do it... 1,000 slash pine seedlings arrive by truck.

Since 2013, we have planted about 7,000 native trees and shrubs and WGC has won many FFGC and NGC awards.

Perhaps the most rewarding moment was when our President, Maria Wolfe, passed the baton to a FAU group and showed them how much fun it can be to clean the beach and how to look for the little plastic pieces buried in the sand. Diane explained that by using the *Clean Swell*(**B** *App* we became part of the International Coastal Cleanup**R** community of volunteers working for a cleaner ocean by picking up millions of pounds of trash each year.
