Ferns are FUN!

OK, so let me begin by saying I am no expert on ferns....I am not a master gardener like so many of our members; but I love gardening and learning new things about plants and how to propagate them. So I humbly come to you in this article to tell you about my adventure with ferns.

When we lived in Nassau, Peter and I had a lovely little house with a stone-floored patio. At some point we decided to build in some wood rafters across the area to provide a bit of shade and also make the patio more aesthetically pleasing.

We began to hang plants in baskets from the rafters, noting that the sun would provide some 'filtered' light that created shadows as the sun moved across the sky; it was a little too much light. So we added some light shade-cloth (similar to the nursery cloth used in their enclosures) to give us the type of sunlight that would be perfect for several of our ferns. Yes, perfect.

Ferns need moderate humidity and moist warm temperatures, The soil should be kept moist but the container must drain well. I do not know how soils are graded here in Florida, but we used a mix of garden soil (#6) with equal parts of potting soil (#4). Mix #6 contained 45-55% planting mix, plus composted tree bark and Canadian Sphagnum. Mix #4 contained 40-48% Canadian Sphagnum, pine bark compost, horticultural grade Perlite and coir (the pith found between the fibers of coconut.)

Avoid fertilizing with manure, compost or peat. An occasional fertilizer, such as Osmocote, fish oil or any low-burn fertilizer (i.e. low in salts) or Miracle-Gro once a month are all good boosters.

We had huge ferns called "Macho" ferns, (Nephrolepis biserreta) to the tiny fragile ferns such as the "Walking Maidenhair" (Adiantum caudatum). There were Staghorns, Silver Hare's Foot, Fluffy Ruffles, Blue Star and of course the Boston Ferns.

> Give your ferns fresh air, some sun and water, and watch 'em grow!

BREAKFAST FRITTATA From the Kitchen of: The Northbridge Inn, Concord, MA Prep Time: 20 minutes Category: Casserole Servings: 8 - 10

Ingredients:

pkg. bulk sausage (1 2 - 16 oz.)
medium purple onion
medium green pepper
medium red pepper
2 - 3 cups frozen hash brown potatoes (thawed)
1 1/2 - 2 cups shredded cheddar
3 tbsp. flour
12 eggs
1 1/3 cups ranch salad dressing
1/2 cup milk
Pash hot sauce to taste

Instructions:

Brown sausage. Saute coarsely chopped peppers and onion. Cool. Add cheese, hash browns and flour. Beat eggs, milk and ranch dressing. Mix all ingredients and pour into a greased large glass casserole.

Bake for about 45 minutes at 325-350 degrees until eggs are set and knife inserted into center comes out clean.

Cut into squares and serve with fresh salsa.
